New cure for colds

MEW cure for the common cold has been discovered.

The Sunday Express was told by a spokesman for the Medical Research. Council yesterday that the results of its tests of the cure would be published shortly, but he preferred to say no more about it at the moment.

With the discovery is associated the name of one of the most famous research doctors in Britain. His discovery was almost accidental. Suffering from a cold one day he tried an entirely unusual remedy.

Attacks germs

Pursuing his research he made a new inhalant from a mould. In this form it compared with the now famous discovery penicillin, though it is not allied to penicillin. It attacks the germs in the nose, tongue and larynx, and it is cheap. Extensive tests—some on naval men—have since been carried out and it is believed they confirm its efficiency. The results of these tests

are about to be published by the Medical Research Council.
